> SUBJECT: Fiscal Note House Bill 218 (LC 39 2175S)

Dear Chairman Martin:

This bill would extend the eligibility limit for receiving a HOPE scholarship for the first time on or after July 1, 2019 from seven years to ten years after high school graduation (or the Georgia Student Finance Commission-certified equivalent). It would maintain the seven-year limit for students who received a HOPE scholarship for the first time between July 1, 2011 and June 30, 2019. It would also ensure that active duty military service does not count against the ten-year period or constitute a failure to be enrolled.

The state would not incur any costs associated with this bill until FY2027, making a cost estimate especially challenging. With assistance from the Georgia Student Finance Commission, we projected costs using the data and assumptions detailed below.

- In FY 2018, there were 55,123 individuals who had received a HOPE Scholarship award, had fewer than 120 semester-hours, and were between eight and ten years from high school graduation.
- Just 1% of individuals who graduated between eight and ten years ago will continue their postsecondary education
- HOPE Scholarship enrollment growth is between 3% and 5% annually.
- In FY 2018, the average HOPE Scholarship award was \$416 for a three-hour course. Award amount growth would increase by approximately 1% to 3% annually.
- In FY 2018, there were 10,500 individuals who had a Zell Miller Scholarship award, had fewer than 120 semester-hours, and were between eight and ten years from high school graduation.

- Zell Miller Scholarship enrollment growth is between 8% and 16% annually. In the last four years, the number of awards has grown 16% annually, but the growth is unlikely to continue at that rate.
- In FY 2018, the average Zell Miller Scholarship award amount was \$634 for a three-hour course. Award amount growth would increase by approximately 1% to 3% annually.
