SUBJECT: Fiscal Note House Bill (LC 49 1413)

Dear Representative Olaleye:

This bill would establish Quality Basic Education (QBE) funding for students living in poverty. The bill defines students living in poverty as those enrolled in a public school who live in a family unit directly receiving SNAP or TANF benefits, homeless students, or foster care students. Additionally, it provides that the program weight would be 1.5 with a teacher-student ratio of 1 to 15.

As shown in **Table 1**, Georgia Department of Education data indicates that the bill would have reduced state spending by approximately \$2.5 million had the bill been in effect during Fiscal Year 2024. This amount would fluctuate each year based on the distribution of the student population among existing QBE program weights. This total also assumes that all students would be moved from QBE segments with higher program weights (e.g., Kindergarten, Grades 1-3 Early Intervention Program) into the students living in poverty program. School districts, however, may report student segments in higher earning program weights that currently exist. This amount is based on the eligible student population of 526,684 full-time equivalents (FTEs) that met the students living in poverty program criteria during the state fiscal year 2023 QBE count.
