SUBJECT: Fiscal Note House Bill (LC 52 0597)

Dear Representative Barnes:

The bill would provide funding to all public schools so that students eligible for free or reducedprice meals receive a school breakfast and lunch at no cost to the student. Additionally, this bill ensures that if federal funding for breakfast programs ceases to exist, the state will provide reimbursement at the same rate per meal served that was in effect during the most recent full school year which federal funds were available.

Currently, \$6.3 million in state funds is appropriated to DOE to cover the full reduced price cost of breakfast and lunch for students who qualify for reduced price meals. Table 1 below shows the current federal funding for free and reduced breakfast. If federal funding for breakfast programs were no longer available, the bill would require the state to spend \$246.1 million to cover current federal spending.

Note: The current cost of reduced price meals is \$.30 for breakfast and \$.40 for lunch.

Estimates were obtained using data from the 2024 school year. Costs will vary by year based on the number of meals served, student eligibility for federal meal assistance, and the cost per meal.
